B. Non-Exploitative Intent

- ✓ I avoid choices that harm people (forced displacement, unfair labor).
- ✓ I avoid choices that harm ecology (destructive construction, waste).
- ✓ I choose stewardship over extraction in everyday life.

C. Value Integration

Rate each on a scale of 0–5:

4. *Practical Readiness Markers*

Purpose: Assess practical milestones that reflect grounded preparation (not just wishful thinking).

- I have routines that support psychological safety (sleep, nutrition, boundaries).
- I can handle basic self-care without external validation.
- I have at least one stable relational anchor (friend, community group, mentor).
- I have financial practices that reflect restraint and responsibility.
- I can hold uncertainty without collapsing emotionally.

Score:

Count Yes's:

3–4: Emerging readiness.

5: Practical readiness is present — continue building with intention.

5. *What’s the next smallest intentional step I can take toward real shelter?*
